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The Unemployment Situation on Guam: June 2022

The unemployment rate in Guam for June 2022 was 4.8 percent, a decrease of 0.3 percentage points from the March 2021 figure of 5.1 percent, and a reduction of 6.6 percentage points from the June 2021 figure one year earlier of 11.4 percent.

The total number of persons unemployed in June 2022 was 3,380, a decrease in the latest quarter and year. The June 2022 statistics continue the trend of declining numbers of unemployed persons and the unemployment rate every quarter consecutively for the last six quarters since the pandemic high figures occurred in December 2020.

Guam's population covered by the survey, 16 years of age and over in March 2022 was 123,980. The covered civilization population is comprised of those in the labor force and those not in the labor force.

The June 2022 unemployment rate reflected a decrease in the number of persons unemployed in recent quarters due to an increase in employment and persons leaving the labor force and no longer looking for work. The number of persons not in the labor force increased from 52,650 in June 2021 to 54,200 in June 2022.

The labor force participation rate, the civilian labor force as a fraction of the civilian population age 16 years of age and over, decreased to 56.2 percent in June 2022 from 58.6 percent in March 2022.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

Data on labor force, employment, and unemployment are derived from the sample survey of households conducted by the Bureau of Labor Statistics in its Current Labor Force Statistics program. These periodic surveys of the population are conducted with a scientifically selected sample of households designed to represent the civilian non-institutional population. Respondents are interviewed to obtain information about the employment status of each member of the household 16 years of age and over. The inquiry relates to activity or status during the calendar week, Sunday through Saturday, which includes the 12th of the month. This is known as the survey week. Actual field interviewing is conducted in the following weeks.

Inmates of institutions, members of the Armed Forces, civilian living in military installations and housings, persons under 16 years of age, and nonimmigrant aliens are not covered in the periodic enumerations and are excluded from this report. Included in this report are citizens of the Federated States of Micronesia, and the Republic of Marshall Islands, who are authorized by the Compact of Free Association to accept employment in the United States and also, citizens of the Republic of Palau which are authorized to accept employment through the Covenant with the U.S. in October 1994.

Employed persons comprise (a) all those within the scope of the survey who, during the survey week did any work at all as paid employees, in their own business, profession, or farm or who worked 15 hours or more as unpaid workers in an enterprise operated by a member of the family, and (b) all those were not working but who had jobs or business from which they were absent because of illness, bad weather, vacation, labor-management dispute, or personal reasons, whether or not they were paid by their employers for the time off, and whether or not they were seeking other jobs.

Each employed person is counted only once. For those who hold more than one job, the job which they worked the greatest number of hours during the reference period is the one counted.

Excluded are persons whose only activity consisted of work around the house (such as, own home housework, and painting or repairing own home) or volunteer work for religious, charitable, and similar organizations.

Unemployed persons comprise of all persons within the scope of the survey, who did not work during the survey week, who made specific efforts to find a job within the past 4 weeks, and who were available for work during the survey week (except for temporary illness). Also included as unemployed are those who did not work at all, were available for work, and (a) were waiting to be called back to a job from which they were laid off; or (b) were waiting to report to a new wage or salary job within 30 days.

The **civilian labor force** comprises the total of all civilians as employed or unemployed in accordance with the criteria described above.

Not in the labor force includes all civilians within the scope of the survey 16 years and over who are not classified as employed or unemployed. Persons doing only incidental unpaid family work (less than 15 hours) are also classified as not in the labor force.

Reliability of the estimates Statistics based on the household and establishment surveys are subject to both sampling and nonsampling error. When a sample, rather than the entire population, is surveyed, there is a chance that the sample estimates may differ from the true population values they represent.

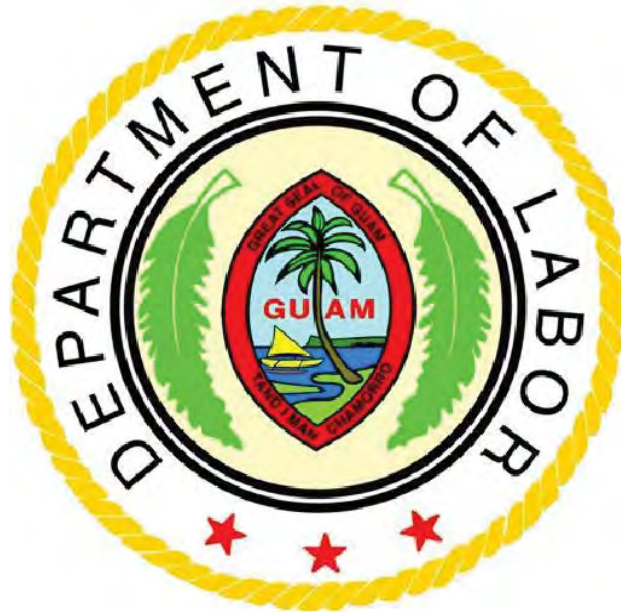
